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
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


FROM THE EDITOR

Fu Jen and Loyola Marymount University Renew their Two-Decade Partnership

 \mathbf{F}^{u} Jen Catholic University has been boosting its global reputation and international influence by forming partnerships with universities and learning institutions throughout the globe. These relationships also bring our students wide-ranging opportunities to collaborate and exchange with friends abroad. It has already been two decades since FJCU initially signed a partnership agreement with Loyola Marymount University (LMU). On November 12 this year, Vice-President of International Affairs, Michael Lee, led a delegation from FJCU to visit LMU. The delegation of five included Li-Ju Tsai Associate Dean of the College of Management; Emily Wu, Director of Public Affairs; Janice Chang, Chief of the Alumni Division; and Steve Kuo, President of the Southern California Fu Jen Catholic University Alumni Association. FJCU renewed our partnership agreement with LMU and seized the rare opportunity of a visit to further cement ties between our institutions, while discussing potential collaborative initiatives between the College of Management at FJCU and the College of Business Administration at LMU.

Situated in Los Angeles, Loyola Marymount University is the largest catholic university on the American west coast. Only a ten minute drive from Los Angeles International Airport and in close proximity to the sea, LMU's favorable geographic location means it could be poised to be part of "Silicon Coast," since the area is attracting hi-tech companies. As a well-respected comprehensive university in America, LMU offers a diverse array of colleges and programs. Both of our schools hope to open up a new era for the sharing and exchange of students and resources.

Renewing the bonds between the two universities, the FJCU delegation was received by Timothy Law Snyder, LMU President; Thomas Poon, Executive Vice President and Provost; Dayle Smith, Dean of the College of Business Administration; and Roberta Espinoza, Vice Provost for Global-Local Initiatives. Vice-Presidents Lee and Poon signed a memorandum of understanding and a student exchange agreement on the day of the visit, while Associate Dean Tsai and Dean Smith discussed possibilities for their respective colleges to collaborate on various projects.

Both universities are exploring multiple avenues for collaboration, such as the 1+1 big data joint master degree. This program would see students graduate from FJCU and then perform internships at Google, Facebook, and other

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hi-tech companies that have partnered with LMU. Another project currently in the works is an EMBA program which would let students at both institutions have the opportunity to get experience as an exchange student in another country. Another interesting idea that was discussed was a potential 3+1+1 five-year BA/MA. Students would complete four years of an articulated curriculum at FJCU and then complete a master's degree at LMU during fifth year. Vice-President Lee says, "Fu Jen was the first to promote this type of program in Taiwan, and we're also the best at it right now."

Fu Jen and Loyola Marymount renewed their partnership for three years, and it is hoped that the programs discussed above will be chiseled out and implemented during that time. Vice-President Lee says, "As part of the upper administration, we provide administrative support and help colleges build bridges and establish connections. It's then up to the colleges to work out the details and implement programs. I'd say it looks like both deans are quite enthusiastic, and I'm confident there will be positive results."

Vice-President Lee also expressed his wish that students take full advantage of these types of partnership agreements with other universities, saying, "I hope students actively pursue opportunities to study abroad and go see what it's like out there. Los Angeles is a major metropolis. It's a multicultural and inviting city, with many hi-tech companies. I hope students go check it out. If you're going to read a lot, go out and experience a lot, too."

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Orange Beneficence: Creating a Better World through the Idea of the Good

The theme for the university's anniversary this year focused on social harmony and a friendly campus. The Orange Beneficence International Conference was hosted several days before anniversary activities and served as a nice prelude. The conference saw research presentations that touched on artistic design, education, mass communication, history and the humanities, health communication, business, consumer lifestyles, biotechnology, and fashion. Presenters made the case that all activities in a community should start from the notion of beneficence – only on such a foundation can all members of a community attain happiness in daily life and work, and only upon such a foundation will Taiwan enjoy a sustainable future. The conference was noteworthy for its open and artistic atmosphere. Organized by the Department of Textiles and Clothing, the Department of Applied Arts, and the MA Program in Brand and Fashion Management, the conference featured guest speakers from a wide array of academic disciplines who called for greater crossdisciplinary dialogue and an end to critical, negative advertising and marketing practices. Ching-Yi Cheng , director of the MA Program in Brand and Fashion Management, said that the color orange was chosen because it blends the vitality of red with the happiness of yellow, symbolizing enthusiasm, charm, joy, innovation, inspiration, and love. The idea behind Orange Beneficence is to produce a type of art which can heal – something truly relevant to the current times.




A Dutch scholar who specializes in fashion research, Pascale Gatzen sported an elegant, hand-woven outfit. She said that art and design provide the momentum of culture and should be forms of non-violent communication. Ms. Gatzen added that we should avoid the old traps of verbal and physical violence, and not forget that everyone shares the same needs for peace, satisfaction, happiness, autonomy, honesty, and love. No one should exclude those from different groups or use punitive forms of communication. Ms. Gatzen likewise advocated the idea of using beneficence as the basis of modern artistic design, since it can change culture and the environment while fulfilling human needs. The design strategies she shared from Europe created real resonance among the audience.

Dr. Ann Marie Fiore from Iowa Sate University said that innovative and sustainable business models are built on services which provide the client with a longterm sense of well-being. Director of the Department of Textiles and Clothing, Zhao-Hua Ho, was inspired to say, "Competition in the fashion industry has been too intense. Many designers pursue the strange, extreme, and unorthodox, but after expending all their creative energies, they find it's a path which is unsustainable." This notion would seem to suggest that any artist whose work is not rooted in good, happiness, and beauty will end up paying a bitter price.

Feng-Chih Cho, a communications scholar at FJCU, pointed out how both Chinese-language and western media have started using click-bait headlines. He suggested that everyone to pay close attention to these trends towards the misleading and ambiguous. A graduate student used the Taiwanese TV show A Boy Named Flora Ato point out that local programming does not need to be crass; its can boast innovative production values while providing the viewer with an experience of healing. Yi-Lin Yu, an instructor at the Department of Advertising and Public Relations, talked about how app games can help older people experience the fun of the hi-tech world. Nae-Chyi Hwang, proposed that historiophoty could be incorporated into the field of communication to build the visual history of one's family, ethnicity, and nation. I-Huei Cheng, associate professor in the College of Communication at National Chengchi University, suggested that positive psychology could be used to escape the negative and instead create healthy forms of communication that promote health, hope, and optimism that are beneficial to increasing social good.

Vice-President for Mission, Father Leszek Niewdana, pointed to the aborigines and the idea of how cultural arts can be preserved and creatively renewed as well as how different peoples can communicate harmoniously. He said that Fu Jen and the Department of Textiles and Clothing can promote those ideas. Director of the Department of Applied Arts, Tsai-hsin Fang, stressed the existing and continuing necessity of research and dialogue between the major academic disciplines. There were many exciting ideas put forth and shared at the Orange Beneficence International Conference, and it is was heartening for many to see the academic world taking a principled stand on many issues.

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Cloud Innovation School powered by AWS: An Opportunity to Train Future Leaders

Eager to seize the new opportunities offered by the era of cloud computing, Fu Jen celebrated the official launch of the Cloud Innovation School on October 29. Founded in collaboration with Amazon Web Services (AWS), the School was created in response to the increasing demand for cloud technology, and serves as a focal point to bring together teaching, research, and collaborative initiatives with industry. After painstaking preparations, the School represents the latest milestone in the university's efforts to boost collaboration with the business world.

The unveiling ceremony for the FJCU Cloud Innovation School powered by AWS was overseen by Vincent Han-Sung Chiang, FJCU President; Robert Wang, AWS Managing Director of Hong Kong and Taiwan; and Tse Wang, AWS Director of the Joint Innovation Center -Greater China Region. In addition, the mayor of New Taipei City, Eric Chu, was invited to deliver opening remarks for the event and bear witness to the School as a testament to the major achievements produced by the collaboration between academia, government, and industry. The ceremony was followed by a training workshop to introduce participants to the exciting new opportunities available in the era of cloud technology and to emphasize that there is no time to waste when it comes to training cloud professionals.

President Chiang said that Fu Jen has great confidence in the potential of the Cloud Innovation School, while noting that the university is acutely aware of the critical role that cloud technology will play in future education and innovation. It is for this reason that FJCU has made cloud technology one of its key areas of focus. Quick to observe the potential of cloud, the university began offering courses in cloud computing back in 2016, and has since become a member of AWS Academy and AWS Educate. Over this time, FJCU has helped two students become AWS Certified Solutions Architect Associates, one of whom has already been recruited by eCLoudvalley, a member of the AWS Partner Network (APN). The university's meticulous efforts have been on abundant display, and there are plans to open more than twenty AWS courses over the next three years. FJCU has recruited twenty instructors who will train fifteen hundred students to become skilled technicians - proof of the university's resolve to stay on top of global developments and actively connect with cloud businesses. As one of the university's major projects this year, the School serves as bridge of the close cooperation between FJCU, industry, and the New Taipei City Government.

Robert Wang, AWS Managing Director of Hong Kong and Taiwan, said that it was an honor for AWS to found the School with Fu Jen Catholic University, and, through

this project, to accelerate the growth and development of local online businesses and companies engaged in cloud computing, while also expanding the number of cloud professionals. For twelve years now, AWS has been the most widely used platform offering cloud services in the world. Through 18 geographical regions, one local region, and 55 Availability Zones, AWS provides clients with more than 125 different services, from computing, storage, and analysis, to database and network services, to machine learning, artificial intelligence, the Internet of Things, and mobile and security services. These have earned AWS the trust of more than one million clients worldwide, and have helped clients to strengthen their basic infrastructure and make their operations more flexible and adaptable while lowering costs at the same time.

Mayor Eric Chu said that New Taipei City has been doing everything it can to promote innovative startups, while actively looking to connect businesses and universities more closely. This can satisfy the market's urgent needs for technical expertise and ensure that what students learn at school is what they use professionally. As the largest business and commercial center in Taiwan, New Taipei City offers a friendly investment environment, and, on August 10 this year, the government officially launched the New Taipei City – AWS Web Innovation Center. This is simply the latest example of the highquality spaces the city offers to start-ups, with others being Innosquare, New Taipei City eSports Training Center, and the New Taipei City Blockchain Promotion Office. These venues support recent graduates as they seek to found start-ups or boost their opportunities in the job market. The School is joining these efforts, incorporating AWS's global resources to create homegrown experts, connect with local industry, and establish firm roots in cloud industries.

Following the unveiling ceremony, FJCU hosted AWS Training Workshop, which featured a series of lectures by academics and industry experts on subjects like "Education x Business Needs x AWS User Group Taiwan," and "Creating a Blue Ocean Using AWS." Speakers reiterated the importance of cloud services and the exciting new opportunities waiting to be explored in the cloud era. Cathy Lai, a certified AWS trainer, shared her thoughts on the real significance of cloud technology in a talk entitled "The New Standards of Cloud Innovation." Huai-Sheng Huang, director of the Cloud Research Service Center and a key actor in establishing the Cloud Innovation School, spoke of his experience teaching cloud operations in the classroom. The afternoon also featured You-Wei Su and Yuan Ma, both graduates of the Department of Information Management at FJCU, who shared their experience in a talk entitled "AWS – Bridging Campus and the Workplace."

Director Wu not only shared his personal experience with students, but also encouraged them with words of hope.

The talk was held in the Cardinal Shan Building. Over three hundred students and faculty members were in attendance. It was an SRO situation, with all seats taken in the auditorium. In the audience were Professor Mei-Zhu Huang of the Accounting Department, Professor Yie-Fang Kao of Fu Jen's School of Continuing Education (SOCE), as well as university President Professor Vincent Han-Sung Chiang, who took time from his busy schedule to interact personally with Director Wu, as well as to address the gathering. Wu is the first person in Taiwan to hold all four "golden awards." He has been the recipient of the Golden Horse Award, the Golden Bell, the Golden Melody, and the Golden Tripod Award. Wu is presently not only a well-known screenwriter and director, but also a devotee of public service. He serves as director of the After School Association of Taiwan.

Director Mei-Zhu Huang told Fu Jen Life that Wu came back to FJCU to share his rich life experience with the hope of inspiring students. "Wu is tough. He has encountered many difficulties in life, but he never gives up. This is something that today's young people can learn from him."

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In his talk, Wu described various interactions with his son, and spoke of everyday events with a touch of humor and grace. Examples he shared might have seemed to his audience to be merely ordinary, and yet at the same time were abundant with philosophical importance. Wu also talked about his education and work. He left students with four encouraging points. First, do what you love in your college years. Your hobbies are your best teachers. Second, make lots of friends. Every person you meet has personal strengths, from which you can learn. Third, never stop educating yourself. Stay alert and enrich yourself every new day. Fourth and finally, remember to give back to society from all you've received. Whenever possible, help people with what you have and who you've become. After all, Wu said, "We should all take heart to cultivate ourselves. We should show our abilities when the right moment arises. If you do so, you will be a truly awesome person."

A ceremony to confer Director Wu with the award of "Outstanding Alumnus of Fu Jen" concluded the event. Professor Wu was the official delegate of the university to confer the honor. It is worth noting that Professor Wu is one of the teachers who inspired and encouraged Director Wu the most as a student at FJCU.

A junior student of the Department of Business Administration surnamed Wu told Fu Jen Life that he has been admiring Director Wu's works for years. He had an impression that Director Wu is a very friendly person, and was resolved to take home with him Mr. Wu's encouragement to "be yourself and never give up." The minute the talk ended, a sophomore in the Accounting Department named Zhang excitedly requested that Mr. Wu autograph his accounting textbook. "Director Wu did exceptionally well in Intermediate Accounting," he commented. "I expect to do the same now that I've got the autograph of an academic star like him in my book."





God Enlightens Dr. Carolyn Woo to See Business as a Force for Good



FJCU recently invited Dr. Carolyn Y. Woo, recipient of a Distinguished President's Fellow Award for Global Development at Purdue University, to give a talk in English entitled "Business as a force for good." Dr. Woo told her audience that the secret of nurturing and educating students lies in cultivating their sense of social responsibility, business ethics, and power. She enlarged on the power aspect, saying she meant the power to influence government. Woo stressed that the message she wanted students to take home with them was the idea that "the meaning of life is not merely to take resources from others."

Professor Woo received her Ph.D. in Strategic Management from Purdue University. She has served as the distinguished President's Fellow for Global Development at Purdue, the President and Chief Executive Officer of Catholic Relief Services (2012-2016), and Dean at Mendoza College of Business at the University of Notre Dame (1997-2011). In addition, Professor Woo happens to be the first female dean to chair the accreditation body for business schools (AACSB: Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business). Dr. Woo is well respected in the international academic community. Her teaching, research and leadership in administrative work have won the praise of many.

Woo believes that wealth is not the only important thing in the world. Business ethics and social responsibility are more important. That being said, businesses should do their part in solving problems in the ecosystem, such as addressing the challenges of climate change. Woo expressed that more often than not, people damage mother nature simply for the sake of business gains. Individual businesses should value the power of unity and sustainable development. Businesses should also base their interests on the public good and overall development of the entire human race. Since businesses have the ability to mitigate and even stop completely the irreversible disaster that climate change brings to world, Woo believes that business must take on more responsibility than other sectors.



Individual businesses should not be over-dependent on technology, said Woo. Although technology comes with tremendous benefits, when poorly managed by knowledge and resources holders, people as well as the world as a whole must pay the price. That is why Woo argued that businesses should incorporate humanity and the mission of service with creative applications of technology, so that we take into account both our future generations and present state of environment.

As a student of Maryknoll Convent School in Hong Kong for 12 years, Woo received enlightenment, care and education from Catholic Sisters. It was at that time she learned the art of sharing. Woo said she had a hard time accepting the fact that only 1% of the population has everything in the world, whereas the other 99% will forever lack resources. Therefore, she said, while we have the resources, we should all think about how to share wealth, talent, power and prayers with others.

As Woo finished her term at Catholic Relief Services in 2016, she realized that she had been putting work first, neglecting the Lord. From that point on, she embarked on her journey of returning to the Lord. Invited by FJCU Vice-President of International Affairs, Professor Michael Lee, Dr. Woo came to FJCU to promote the idea that businesses should set their missions with the goal of improving society. Her talk was another step toward manifesting her love for the Lord and society.

Woo delivered her talk in English, attracting a good number of international students. MBA students from Professor Ariana Chang's class attended this talk. When Professor Chang was a student, Professor Michael Lee inspired her in the areas of social enterprise, innovation and entrepreneurship. Given that Professor Lee invited Dr. Woo to give a talk at FJCU, Chang wanted to maximize the academic value of the event. She therefore took her students to the venue to learn more about social enterprises, and become acquainted with various views based on Dr. Woo's experience.

Ai-mei Hsieh, a senior in the Department of Management of Business Administration, said that the talk was highly relevant to current world events. A Catholic herself, Hsieh was inspired by Woo's story of how religion impacted on her life. Hsieh posed a question for Dr. Woo during the Q & A session. She asked, "In the face of our highly competitive society, how should students respond to the immense pressure they feel from both campus and society?"

President Vincent Han-Sung Chiang and Dr. Hung Kun-Long Win at Seventh New Taipei City Health Charity Award

Fu Jen Catholic University performed well at the Seventh New Taipei City Health Charity Awards, with President Vincent Han-Sung Chiang earning a Medical Contribution Award, and deputy duperintendent of the FJCU Hospital, Dr. Kun-Long Hung, collecting a Medical Research Award. The awards were presented at a ceremony on November 11, one day before Doctors' Day.

The FJCU Hospital has been up and running for only one year, yet has nevertheless already expanded medical coverage for the four million residents of New Taipei City. Despite still being in its infancy phase, the hospital has impressively earned recognition from the medical community. The 9,200 doctors in New Taipei City need to serve a population of four million, which works out to an average of 435 patients per doctor–a rather heavy demand. This also means that Fu Jen's role in producing medical specialists and providing healthcare will only become more important in the coming years.

A medical practitioner with forty-four years of experience, Dr. Chiang has been an expert in the field of urology for many years now. He helped establish the Taiwanese Continence Society, which has benefited countless patients and helped earn him a lifetime achievement award. During his tenure as dean of the College of Medicine at FJCU, Dr. Chiang worked closely with the Department of Health in New Taipei City to provide community medical services. Also under his leadership, the university established the FJCU Clinic, taking care not only of faculty, staff, and students, but servicing the wider community as well. Since its founding, the clinic has received more than 125,000 patient visits. Dr. Chiang said, "The Fu Jen Clinic and Fu Jen Hospital were both created with the goals to reverence God, love our fellow humans, and treat the patient as family. Given the population density of New Taipei City, we also wanted to help address the scarcity of medical resources." From the initial idea of building the hospital to its official

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opening, Dr. Chiang's commitment to helping patients has been consistent.

The Seventh New Taipei City Health Charity Awards included prizes in six categories, such as the Special Medical Contribution Award and Medical Services Award. Out of the fifty-nine contestants, only twenty-five went home with an award. Judges carefully assessed contestants in numerous categories, such as expertise, professional contributions, and medical research.

Dr. Kun-Long Hung is a pediatrician who has served at both National Taiwan University Hospital and Cathay General Hospital in a range of teaching, administrative, and research capacities. He now brings his thirty-one years of teaching and medical experience, as well as award-winning expertise, to Fu Jen. Dr. Hung has written and published extensively on the problem-based learning approach for which the Fu Jen College of Medicine is well-known. He has won awards for his writings, scholarship, and service, including the Innovative Global Service Award and the Community Service Award for twice leading medical teams to Ulan Bator, Mongolia, where they provided medical services to local residents. After receiving this award, Dr. Hung said that his mission at the College of Medicine is to produce medical specialists. He also reaffirmed his commitment to training medical professionals who can put what they have learned to practical use in the service of the community and nation.

New Taipei City mayor, Eric Chu, spoke of the greatness of doctors while conferring the awards. He also acknowledged the often overlooked contributions of medical educators and medical personnel, noting how they work round-the-clock all year, rain or shine, giving their all to help patients. Taiwan currently faces many challenges: a low birth rate, an aging population, and scarce resources. These challenges will be no less daunting in the future. Mayor Chu expressed his hopes that the continued efforts of the medical community will guarantee healthcare for all citizens and ensure the sustainability of medical resources.





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
